LSV Trainees take on all sorts of new pathways after graduating, some of them joining the New Zealand Defence Force.

## FROM TRAINEE TO RECRUIT

Roman\* had dreamed of serving in the forces since he was a young child. After leaving school, Roman picked up work at a local supermarket, however it was clear that this was not his long-term calling. With a lack of other opportunities, LSV seemed like the perfect opportunity to test whether the military was the right career path

Although Roman was shy and reserved to begin with, he underwent a remarkable transformation over the 6 weeks and marched out a confident young man with excellent leadership skills. On top of this, he had a high standard of self-discipline and was an outstanding role model for all. This was recognised by his fellow trainees, as he received the Peers Choice award. Roman returned home and picked up the odd shift at his local supermarket, however he was more determined that ever to succeed in his application for the defence force.

Roman wrote to Rachel Unuia, the LSV Work Broker at Trentham, confirming that he had been accepted to the Navy in February 2024: "[I am] just emailing you to say thank you to you, and all the staff at LSV. Even though it was only six weeks my time at LSV was a highlight of my life. I'm off to Navy basic training today to start my next journey, who knows you might see my walking around Trentham base one day.

Wish me luck and again thank you."

# **A FAMILY AFFAIR**

Inspired by whānau, Curtis\* secured employment before his course graduation.

## **IMMEDIATE EMPLOYMENT**

Curtis\* admired the progress his brother and sister made at LSV over 10 years ago, however attending himself seemed an impossible dream in 2021-2022. Curtis was in prison. During that period, he had time to reflect, and began the steps to building a better future for himself. In 2023, he wanted to emulate his siblings, to make his whānau proud, and to attend LSV for himself.

In Curtis' application, it was clear that he was determined: "I think by pursuing this course I will gain the confidence within myself to be a better person, a better Dad and one day a partner. But also, this will have positive effects on whānau. I see this as an opportunity to ground myself in who I am and where I want to be in life. A change, a positive change that is. A chance to make it right." During the course, Curtis flourished. He gained a restricted license and employment at a building firm before the course was finished. It was, however, the personal growth that may have the most lasting impact. He challenged his own beliefs, constantly strived for a better future, and learned how to deal with his emotions. It was a remarkable turnaround in six weeks.

Curtis exited a benefit on the Monday after graduation, which was a massive step in his journey. His progress and potential were not only recognised by his new employer. The MSD team at Trentham also noted this: "In the right environment, he proved to be a loyal and dedicated team member. Curtis should take great pride in the personal growth that he has achieved."

The awards, run by the Defence Employer Support Council (DESC), acknowledge the employers who support part time NZDF personnel, allowing them to attend training and development opportunities so they may effectively supplement our Regular Force members when required.

The Tohu Awards also celebrate employers who support the Limited Service Volunteer (LSV) programme and its graduates. The LSV programme supports youth in developing skills to seek employment and make positive, long-term contributions to their community

Congratulations to our 2024 award winners and thank you to those who nominated organisations that show their support for our people and the role they play in the New Zealand Defence Force.

## Limited Service Volunteer of the Year

The Limited Service Volunteer of the Year is awarded to Kayzian Bevan who graduated at Burnham Military Camp in July 2023. Kayzian saw the LSV programme as an opportunity to challenge himself and make positive changes in his life. Kayzian's confidence grew, he rediscovered his passion for Te Ao Māori and Kapa Haka, which in turn reignited his desire to reconnect with his whakapapa. Since graduating Kayzian was offered and accepted a job with Te Wānanga o Raukawa as a Waste Management Officer, while also enrolling in Poupou Huia Te Reo (level 4) classes. He is an inspiration to any LSV trainee and a fantastic example of the personal growth that can be achieved with hard work and perseverance.

## Outstanding Contribution to the Limited Service Volunteer Programme

Jenny Pewhairangi is recognised for an Outstanding Contribution to the Limited Service Volunteer Programme. Jenny has been the Regional Champion for Taranaki since 2011, she understands the vision and purpose of the LSV programme and remains passionate about the difference it can make to the trainees. She offers support to prepare them for the course, ensures they get transport to their location and makes sure they have ongoing support afterwards. With Jenny's help, trainees feel safe, strong and independent throughout the process.

## Employer Recognition to the Limited Service Volunteer Programme award

Employer FENZ has received the Employer Recognition to the Limited Service Volunteer Programme award. Mark Elstone and his team from FENZ have been engaging with the programme since 2019. The FENZ team actively participate in each course encouraging trainees during their time in the programme. Their support is continuing to increase and they are a key enabler of the LSV programme.

## **INTRODUCING OUR PATRONS**

## Steve Abley (Patron of LSV South 04/24) reflects on his employment journey and the Limited Service Volunteer Course.

My simple story is that I grew up in a single parent household from the age of 14 months and my mum was on a benefit for almost all that time. I left school aged 16 with the equivalent of NCEA Level 2. The year was 1988 and there was limited work in NZ given the share market crash a year prior. Over the next few years unemployment rose to a peak of 11.2% which is the highest ever recorded. Simplistically, NZ was a dire place to be.

I had been introduced to surveying at school and I had an interest in technical drawing. I needed to find work so I door knocked every surveyor in Christchurch that had an advertisement in the Yellow Pages. This took about a week and resulted in zero job offers. Nevertheless, I made an impact with one potential employer who about three months later invited me back for a competitive interview as an engineering technician. That was the only result of my door knocking, one lead.

Even so, that one lead was enough. I gained that role and was appointed as a 'junior office boy' and yes, that was the actual job title. The job paid so little I could not afford to leave home and regardless; my mother did not want me to. Although I grew up in a poor family, I was provided with a safe, structured, and loving household.

I worked hard at my new job, and I learnt a lot. My employer offered me time off and I undertook part-time engineering classes at Polytechnic. I took that opportunity, and then I did a few more classes, and a few more and then even more. After 5 years part-time study I gained a level 5 qualification.

After that success I had a renewed thirst for education and after working some more, and even harder, I went to university. I was the first in my wider family to do that, ever. University was very difficult for me academically, but I found I had other skills that compensated. My greatest talent was perseverance that meant I gained my Bachelor's Degree in Civil Engineering (with Honours) (a level 8 qualification) and in short time and my career and life evolved.

Today, at 53, I'm the chief executive of Abley, a professional services firm I founded roughly 20 years ago which employs about 80 people from three offices in NZ and undertakes work in Canada, USA, Australia, Brunei and Indonesia (via Australia). More impressive though is my long-time Christchurch girlfriend and I married some 20 years ago in London and today we have a family of three aged, 16, 13 and 11.
